ELIGIBILITY TO REGISTER TO VOTE

- A United States citizen
- Must reside at your address for over 28 days prior to election day
- At least 18 years of age, or will be by the date of the election
- Not currently serving a state or federal prison term for conviction of a felony

Wisconsin requires proof of residence for voter registration.

VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINES

MARCH 13TH, 2024

Online and mail deadline for April 2nd election

JULY 24TH, 2024

Online and mail deadline for August 15th election

OCTOBER 16TH, 2024

Online and mail deadline for November 5th election

In person registration is available in Wisconsin up to and including election day. Visit your county election office any time or your polling location on election day only to register in person.

ABSENTEE VOTING DEADLINES

MARCH 28TH, 2024 AT 5:00 PM

Deadline to request an absentee ballot for April 2nd election

APRIL 2ND, 2024 AT 8:00 PM

Deadline to return your absentee ballot for April 2nd election

AUGUST 8TH, 2024 AT 5:00 PM

Deadline to request your absentee ballot for August 13th election

AUGUST 13TH, 2024 AT 8:00 PM

Deadline to return your absentee ballot for August 13th election

Voters can possibly request and vote an absentee ballot in-person in their municipal clerk's office through election day. Office hours vary by municipality. Some municipal offices may not offer additional in-person absentee hours. Check MyVote or contact your municipal clerk for absentee voting hours.

Your ballot should be returned to your Municipal Clerk's Office via mail no later than 8:00 PM on election day.

MAKE A PLAN TO VOTE

VOTE BY MAIL

- Request your absentee ballot at:
www.myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Vote-Absentee-By-Mail
- Ballots can be mailed or dropped off at your Municipal Clerk's office before November 8th at 8:00 PM

VOTE IN-PERSON ABSENTEE

- Each city, village and town is responsible for setting the dates and hours of in-person absentee voting for their municipality, though it can begin no earlier than 14 days before the election and ends no later than the Sunday before the election. To find the dates and hours for in-person absentee voting where you live, contact your municipal clerk's office or visit <https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Vote-Absentee-In-Person>.

VOTE ON ELECTION DAY

- Polls will be open on election day from 7:00 AM – 8:00 PM.

- Wisconsin requires a photo ID to vote in an election. For a list of acceptable photo IDs, visit:

TIPS & RESOURCES

- It is recommended to mail your ballot at least 5 business days at the latest before the deadline to make sure the ballot is received by the municipality. If you are within 5 days we recommend dropping off your ballot at your county elections office instead of mailing it to ensure it arrives safely.

- When filling out a paper ballot make sure to select only one option for each election or question and fill in the oval completely with a black or blue pen.
